Recycling and Trash Collection For Residents & Businesses with Municipal Trash

Trash is collected once a week. Recyclables are picked up every Penalties. Failure to comply with other week (see pages 8-9 for street listings and schedule). Residents are required to separate recyclable material from trash. (On City website, search for "Ordinances," then see Health and Sanitation Ordinance, Chapter 8, Article III. Division 1.) The materials which must be recycled are cardboard, paper, glass bottles and jars. metal cans and aluminum foil/ foil pans, and plastics with recycle numbers 1 through 7.

(Sec. 8-93 Enforcement & recycling ordinance carries a \$100 fine.)

Every household received one 64-gallon recycling cart. It is green with a black lid (see photo). Please label it with your address. The carts belong to the house and must be left at the house in the event of a move. If the cart is missing, residents may use any barrel which is clearly marked "Recycle." The City Health Department can

provide you with such labels.

Please remember to place the recycle carts three feet from other objects, with the wheels toward the house.

Do not overfill barrels and please clean up after pickup.

NEW! If cardboard is more than 3 feet tall or wide, cut it or fold it. Also, flatten, tie and tape it into bundles.

Recycling Carts



No Plastic bags of any type in the recycling barrel. Please recycle plastic bags at the grocery store.

Additional recycling may be placed in bins clearly marked RECYCLING. Free recycling stickers may be picked up at City Hall.

Trash Reminders

Bulky items like furniture and carpet (cut in 4-foot sections) must have a bulk sticker attached. Bulk stickers can be purchased at Health Dept. in City Hall for \$5 per item, one item out per week. No large appliances or metal items allowed. Fees subject to change. Only one bulk item per

Mattresses and box springs in good condition may find a new home via Newburyport Virtual Yard Sale, FreeCycle, or NextDoor.com. Recycle: as long as a mattress or box spring is dry it can be recycled by UTEC

for \$15. Come to the Health Department in City Hall with cash or a check to register for a UTEC pick-up, or call to arrange to drop it off at the Newburyport Recycle Center. Trash: Residents may also buy a \$20 bulk sticker in order for the item to be picked up as trash.

Construction materials (including toilets and sinks) are not allowed in the trash and must be taken to a disposal site.

To dispose of Latex Paint: dry it out, set up to 4 paint cans next to your trash, put the lids

on loosely. Use kitty litter for fast drying. NEW: Or drop off non-dried-out latex paint to be recycled, May -September, at the Recycle Center. Small fee applies.

Trash is limited to 6 15-gallon bags or 3 (32 gal) barrels per household each week. Barrels 64 gallons and larger will not be picked up.

Do not go above the rim of your barrel and clean up after your pick up. Put trash out after 5 pm the day before and before 7 am the day of pick up. Bring empty barrels back in by 6 pm.

Curbside Recycling Reminders

- Recycling is mandatory and will be enforced.
- Recycling is single stream; place all recyclables in the same container. Set recycling carts and trash out by 7:00 am on collection day.
- No plastic bags of any kind in recycling carts, even if they have a recycle number. The place to recycle plastic bags is in a supermarket's specially marked bin.
- Large cardboard must be cut and folded so it is no more than 3 feet wide or tall. It must be bundled, tied and left next to your container.
- No textiles (i.e. fabric, clothing) in recycling carts.
 Take to a thrift store or EcoSmith bin (see page 4).
- Containers must be rinsed or wiped out, but do not have to be completely clean.
- No clothes hangers in recycle carts. Wire hangers may be taken to dry cleaners.
- No electronics, batteries, cell phones, oil, oil-based paint, fluorescent bulbs (including CFLs), appliances (large or small), plastic bags or Styrofoam in recycling carts. These items can be recycled at the Recycling Center (see p. 3).
- Glass bottles/jars must be clear, green, or brown in a curbside recycling bin. No broken glass or other

- glass such as light bulbs, window or auto glass, dishes, glasses or Pyrex. (see p. 4)
- Metal items other than food cans may not go in curbside carts. Other metal (e.g. pots and pans, grills) may be taken to the Recycle Center (see p. 3).
- Plastic containers which have recycle symbols 1 7 are allowed. No un-numbered plastics. Leave plastic caps/lids on plastic bottles.
- No Styrofoam, even if labeled "recyclable." Put in trash or take non-food types to Colby Farm Lane Recycling Center (see p. 3).
- Paper- (non-food types) Recycle all your clean paper!
- Styrofoam peanuts can go to Pak Mail.
- Tin, steel, and aluminum: Food cans and lids, deposit and non-deposit beverage cans (can be flattened), clean aluminum foil and foil pans, and empty aerosol cans are okay. No cans which contained hazardous material or paint.
- You may use an overflow barrel if clearly marked and placed close to recycling cart.

Bagged Leaves & Christmas Trees

- Bagged leaf collections will take place on the following Saturdays: November 2, November 23, December 14, 2019 and May 2 and 16, 2020.
- <u>Place leaves in brown leaf bags</u> or loose in a marked barrel. Please fold bags over at the top.
- Leaves will be going to a farm for composting so please keep trash out of the leaf bags.
- Christmas tree collections will take place during the month of January only.
- Trees over 6 feet must be cut down in size.
- Trash pick up may be delayed during Christmas Tree weeks.
- Wreaths: Bring to Colby Farm Lane Yard Waste Facility or Recycle Center.

- Gas grills Remove propane tank and briquettes/rocks bring to scrap metal dealer or Recycling Center first Saturday of
- · Glass Jars and bottles go in curbside recycling. Incandescent bulbs go in the trash. Fluorescent bulbs to Recycling Center*. Windows, see below. Wrap broken glass for the trash. Glasses, Pyrex, and dishes for re-use. See pg 2.
- Grease/Oil Never put down the drain. Bring to Recycling Center or cool and put in your trash.
- Gutters Aluminum gutters may be brought to scrap metal dealer or brought to Recycling Center.* Wood gutters may be brought to disposal company like G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- Helium Tanks Bring to Recycling Center. Fees may apply.*
- Latex paints To recycle, see page 1. For curbside pick up, dry paint completely, set next to trash with lid on loosely. Use kitty litter for fast drying. Only four cans per week.
- · Lumber Call disposal company like G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581 or Pearson 978-465-3649.
- Mattress and boxspring see page 1
- Medical Syringes/Lancets Must be disposed of properly. See page 7.
- Mercury products- such as thermostats & thermometers, blood pressure cuffs, barometers Bring to Recycling Center.*
- Metal Goods Appliances, bikes, water heaters, etc. go to scrap metal dealer or Recycling Center*. Fees may apply.
- Microwaves Bring to Recycling Center. Small fee applies.*
- · **Motor oil (used)** Bring to Recycling Center, no fee. *
- Needles/Syringes/Lancets: Must be disposed of properly. See page 7.
- Oil-based paint Bring to one of Household Hazardous Waste Days (see p. 3). Fee applies.
- Plastic Bags All plastic bags must be recycled at supermarkets.
- Propane tanks Bring to Recycling Center. Fee applies.
- Recyclables Large quantities of recyclable containers and newspapers may be brought to G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- Refrigerators See National Grid website for pick up and possible rebate. For pick-up call a company like Foucault Appliance for removal 978-372-6117 or bring to Recycling Center.
- Smoke Detectors Bring to City Hall Health Department or Recycling Center*.
- -Solvents, chemicals, pesticides, etc Bring to next Household Hazardous Waste Day (see page 3) Fees apply.
- Styrofoam WHITE packing forms only. Please remove stickers/tape. No food containers. Bring to the Recycling Center.* Peanuts go to Pak-Mail
- Televisions working flatscreen TVs that were made within the last five years can be donated to Goodwill in Seabrook. Best Buy accepts some TVs (call to verify). Any TV can be dropped off at the Recycling Center*. Fees apply.
- Textiles Old clothing, shoes, blankets, pillows, stuffed animal etc. leave in white recycling bins at Nock/Molin School or Bresnahan School parking lot or Yard Waste Facility. Items in good condition will be reused. Others will be recycled.
- Tires Bring to Recycling Center. \$3 fee per tire.*
- Toxic/Hazardous Chemicals Bring to Household Hazardous Waste Day on August 24, 2019 see p. 3. Fees apply.
- · Windows Disposal company like G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- Wooden items Large wooden items (other than furniture with bulk stickers from the Recycling Department) will not be accepted at the curb. Call a disposal company like G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.

Burning

The season for open burning is from January 15 to May 1 from 10 am to 4 pm. Property owners must obtain a valid permit from the fire department (978-465-4427) before conducting any open burning. Permits allow the burning of brush, cane, driftwood, and forest debris but prohibit the burning of grass, hay, leaves and tires.

Keep fire suppression tools handy and monitor the burn closely until it is dead out.

S.O.S. Save Our Sewers

Fats, Oils and Grease (FOG) are a major cause of plumbing back ups in homes and in the City sewer system that YOU can help prevent.



Never pour grease or other household oils down sinks or toilets. Pour cooled cooking fats, oils and grease into a waxed food container (such as a milk or cream container) and dispose of it in the garbage.

Excluding Your Property from Application of Pesticides

Requests to have your property excluded from pesticide application for mosquito control may be made online (or by downloading printable forms) from www.mass.gov/how-to/exclusion-from-wide-area-pesticides-application. Recycle Clothing & Textiles

Clothing and textiles placed in EcoSmith bins get re-used or recycled. Stains and rips are OK. Bins are at Bresnahan School



(North Atkinson St. entrance) and Nock/ Molin Schools (Low St. parking lot), and at Yard Waste Facility.

Massachusetts is an Idle Free Zone

Massachusetts law prohibits unnecessary and unattended engine idling. Violators can be punished by a fine up to \$100.



Turning off your engine, protects:

- The environment. Idling engines contribute to smog and global warming.
- Our health. Exhaust pollution is harmful to people and animals.
- Your money. The less fuel your engine consumes, the more money you save.
- Your engine. Idling gradually wears out components such as engine oil, spark plugs, and the exhaust system.

Turn off the engine as soon as you end your trip. You'll be protecting the environment, your health, and saving money. Idling gets you nowhere.

Reduce your trash by up to 40 percent by composting. There are two options in Newburyport.

Purchase a Discounted Composter

The City of Newburyport sells backyard composters, known as the Earth Machine, designed to compost food and yard waste. It will provide an all-natural nutrient-rich supplement for gardens or lawns. The 80-gallon bins are sold from the Recycling Office for \$25 for residents, and \$43 for non-residents.



Animal Control Services, 978-465-4410

The Animal Control Officer (ACO) is responsible for ensuring compliance and enforcement of the Massachusetts State Sanitary Code 330 CMR 10.00 "Prevention of the Spread of Rabies", The Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources-Animal Health, Commonwealth of Massachusetts General Law Chapter 129 and the City of Newburyport leash law and proper disposal of animal waste. The ACO is also an Animal Inspector responsible for investigating animal bites and working with local veterinarians to determine an appropriate quarantine procedure to monitor or rule out any possible exposure to the rabies virus.

Dog Licenses: All dogs six months of age or older must be licensed with the City through the City Clerk's Office by April 1 each year (after June 1, late fees will apply.) Proof of current rabies vaccination is required for licensing. License tags must be worn on a collar at all times.

License Fees: Neutered/Spayed Dogs: \$10; Reproductively Intact Dogs: \$15.

Fee is waived for Senior Citizens age 65 and over; and for individuals who are blind, deaf or mobility impaired

Lost & Found Pets: To report a lost or found pet, call the ACO at 978-465-4410 . On nights and weekends, contact the Police Department at 978-462-4411. Residents may wish to post notice on Facebook at: https://www.facebook.com/ NBPTAreaLostandFoundPets.

Leash Law Section 3-26: No person shall own or keep in the City, outside the confines of the owner's or keeper's property, any dog which is not held firmly on a leash. Failure to comply with subsection (a) shall be punishable by the following schedule of fines: First offense \$50.00 Second offense \$75.00 Third offense \$100.00

Dogs On Beaches: The owner or person in control of a dog or any other animal shall not allow it to be on any part of the public beach between May 15 and September 15 of each year. From September 16 through May 14 dogs are allowed on beach; however, they <u>must</u> be held firmly on a leash at all times.

Pet Waste Disposal: Pet waste should be contained in a sealed bag and disposed of in small amounts with household trash. The City provides dog waste receptacles and bag dispensers at various locations throughout the City. (See map.) Dog waste must **never** be thrown in someone else's trash or in Recycle Containers or Solar Big Bellies.

Disposal of Animal Waste: Section 3-2: All persons owning or in custody of an animal will be responsible for removal and disposal of that animal's waste. The fine for violation of this provision for the first offense shall be \$50.; for second offense \$75.; third subsequent offenses \$100.

LOCK UP YOUR MEDSTM

Public Health, 978-465-4410

The Public Health Department provides health education, disease surveillance and investigation, health screenings, referrals and immunization clinics for the Newburyport community.

City Wide Flu Clinics are offered by the Health Department each year. Dates, times and locations of Clinics are published in the newspaper, City Website and on Cable News. Flu vaccines are also available at the Health Department by appointment.

Blood Pressure Checks: The Public Health Nurse is available by appointment to perform blood pressure checks in the Health Department Office, at no charge.

Disease Investigation and Surveillance: The Health Department investigates and follows up on a list of infectious diseases. Collaborating with the Massachusetts Department of Public Health and health care providers, the Public Health Nurse assists with enforcement of state isolation and quarantine regulations.

Substance Abuse Services: Contact the Mass Substance Abuse Information and Education Helpline at **1-800-327-5050** or at www.helpline-online.com for free and confidential information and referrals for alcohol and other drug abuse problems and related concerns. Counseling and treatment options for substance abuse are also posted on the City Website.


SHARPS: Hypodermic Needles, Syringes, Lancets


Residents may dispose of their "SHARPS" in one of the collection kiosks located at the Health Department at City Hall or at the Senior Center at 331 High Street. Never place loose sharps in the kiosk; they must be contained in rigid plastic containers, such as a laundry detergent bottle. Disposing of sharps in the trash is against the law; and you should never leave sharp's containers outside of the kiosk. If the kiosk is full or your container is too large to fit in the kiosk, please contact a staff member or call the Health Department at 978-465-4410 for assistance.

Help protect young people by safeguarding your prescription medications with 3 easy steps





3. DISPOSE OF YOUR UNUSED MEDICATION PROPERLY: Prescription Tablets and Capsules: Medications can be disposed of 24 hours a day at the Newburyport Police Department, 60 Green Street. Over the counter medications can be disposed of with your household trash.

To dispose of liquid medication: 1. Mix the medication with an undesirable substance, such as coffee grounds or kitty litter. 2. Place the mixture in a sealable bag. 3. Dispose of it with your trash.

Syringes: Syringes must never be disposed of in the trash. See the box above for information about Sharps Collection Kiosks in Newburyport.

North Shore Mother Visiting Partnership

The City of Newburyport is so pleased to welcome the newest member of your family to the Newburyport community! Newburyport



residents are invited you to receive a free one time visit from the Public Health Nurse. The nurse will visit a mother or caregiver, ideally within 12 weeks (but up to one year) of giving birth or adopting a baby, regardless of the mother's age, insurance, income or number of children. The visit will last approximately 1 ½ hours and will take place in the mother's home or at a mutually agreed upon location. The visit includes a weight check for baby, breastfeeding & newborn care support, local resource guide and infant CPR/ Choke saving demonstration. Caregivers will also receive a Baby Box filled with gifts for mom and baby. All services provided by the Public Health Nurse are free and confidential. 
